A Look Back at The Friends in 2010

The year 2010 was an active on for the Friends of the Westfield Memorial Library. The Book Discussion Group met on January 20th to discuss *Olive Kitteridge* by Elizabeth Strout. In March, the group discussed *The Commoner* by John Burnham and *Ruth* by Elizabeth Gaskill in May.



In March, Linnea Rhodes was awarded the Kenneth S. Gaston Award. This award was named in honor of the first President of the Library Board of Trustees who passed away in 1975. The award

was established to recognize those who supported and furthered the activities of the Library. Linnea was recognized for her service as Co-President, for initiating and promoting the Museum Pass Program, her efforts at the Annual Spring Book Sale and for being instrumental in the Museum Project which saw framed posters of museum posters put on permanent in the Meeting Room at the Library.

On April 8th, Assemblyman Jon Bramnick delivered the first Anne Hale Speaker Series talk of 2010. His topic was "Trenton: An Inside Look at State Government Decision Making". Other speakers scheduled later in the year included former Major Leaguer Jeff Torborg and NYC Health Commissioner Dr. Thomas Farley, both Westfield residents and author and researcher Arthur Lefkowitz.

Donations to the Annual Spring Book Sale were accepted from April 15th through the 17th and the sale began on Wednesday, April 21st and ended with Bag Day on Saturday, April 24th.

On May 3rd, Gail Stavitshy, chief curator of the Montclair Art Museum, gave a talk on "A Force of Change: African-American Art and the Julius Rosewald Fund" which was a current exhibit at the Montclair Art Museum. Her talk had been postponed from February, due to inclement weather, and included the unveiling of the permanent exhibit of framed Museum Posters in the Library Meeting Room.

In June the Friends began accepting applications for the Opera Series that included *Rigoletto*, *Carmen*, *La Boheme*, *La Fancuilla 8Del West* in the Fall of 2010 as well as several additional operas
