HALE SPEAKER SERIES

To mark the 300th anniversary of Westfield, the town's historian will kick off the 13th annual Hale Speaker Series on Wednesday, March 18.

Robert Wendel, a member of the town's Historic Preservation Commission, will discuss "Westfield's Revolutionary War Homes---Then and Now," at 7 p.m.in the meeting room at the Westfield Memorial Library, 550 East Broad Street.

Wendel, who served for more than a quarter century in the insurance industry, is chief operating officer for Wendel Financial Group. His love of history commenced when, as a collegian, he worked as assistant manager for the Pabst Mansion in Milwaukee. A Westfield resident since 1991, Wendel has served as curator for the town's Historical Society archives, and vice president of the society's board. He currently serves as a member of the board of governors for the Miller-Cory House Museum.

The Hale Speaker Series was founded by the late Lee Hale in memory of his wife, Anne. The series receives financial support from the Anne and Lee Hale Fund and The Thomas Glasser Foundation, and is hosted by The Friends of Westfield Memorial Library. Linnea Rhodes serves as chairman of the Hale Speaker Series committee that also includes the Hales' daughter, Barbara; Mary Orlando, Sherry Cronin, Ellen Albertson and Tina Lesher.

The Friends of the Westfield Memorial Library sponsor a Wednesday subscription series to the Metropolitan Opera at Lincoln Center in New York. Transportation is by charter bus from Westfield to Lincoln Center. There are several openings and new participants are invited to join.

A few tickets are available for the remaining performances of the current 2019-2020 season: Der Fliegende Hollander (Wagner) on March 18, Madama

Butterfly (Puccini) on April 1 and Kat'a Kabanova (Janacek) on May 6.

Registration for the upcoming 2020-21 season will start in March. Ticket prices range from \$28 (Family Circle) to over \$180 (Orchestra) per performance – your choice! The bus **usually** leaves at 5:00 p.m. from Westfield and costs approximately \$34 per performance pending number of participants.

Members who are not interested in a full subscription may share a subscription with friends or other interested participants and still enjoy the 15% discount on subscription ticket prices. Alternatively, you can sign up for one whole subscription and change one or more operas to other ones on the list (e.g. double them) to enjoy them together with a friend or spouse.

If you cannot attend an opera you may exchange the ticket through the Met subscription office or sell it to someone else. The opera group maintains a "Standby List" of people who have expressed an interest in buying tickets for individual operas. 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

MUSEUM PASS PROGAM



Changes are coming to the Friends' Museum Pass offerings. We are seeing some new museum policies that are more friendly to libraries and unfortunately some that are less welcoming to libraries. As of mid-May, Grounds for Sculpture is no longer offering museum passes for libraries. The museum administration reported that they were forced to discontinue library passes because the program was costing them \$400,000.00 each year. On a more positive note starting in March The Frick is now offering a "print on demand" option for libraries. This allows our patrons to access the Frick pass on any day the museum is open, but they must commit to a specific date. Passes may be reserved "first come/first served" in person at the library up to 2 weeks in advance, and 2 or 4 people can reserve a pass for any available date.

We are now offering 23 museums. We have dropped the Yogi Berra Museum due to lack of interest. 2Fer Museums (passes for two museums may be signed at the same time) are: Brooklyn Botanic Garden (Brooklyn), Children's' Museum of Manhattan (NY), Cooper Hewitt National Design Museum (NY), Frick Collection (NY), International Center of Photography (NY), Montclair Art Museum (NJ), Morris Museum (NJ), Museum of Arts and Design (NY), Museum of the City Of New York (NY), Museum of Early Trades and Crafts (NJ), Museum of the Moving Image (NY), New-York Historical Society (NY), Newark Museum (NJ), New York Transit Museum (Brooklyn), Skyscraper Museum (NY), Stickley Museum at Craftsman Farms (NJ), and Storm King Art Center (NY-open April 4 through November)

Premiere Museums (passes may not be combined with other museum passes) are: American Museum of Natural History (NY), Grounds for Sculpture (NJ) through midMay, Intrepid Sea, Air and Space Museum (NY), Jewish Museum, Museum of Modern Art, and Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum (NY.)

In addition, library card holders are eligible for a \$3.00 discount on admission to the Liberty Science Center in Jersey City, NJ. Each visitor must present his/her WML card to get the discount.

Before you visit be sure to check each museum for their hours and exhibitions. For general information please go to the library website (www.wmlnj.org) or check out the Museum Pass bulletin board in the library.


